


CONTEXT

- Opposite ends of the Newcastle LGA
- Located on peninsular bounded by the Hunter River and open ocean.
- Connected to Newcastle CBD by Ferry Service
- Distinct coastal town character.



HISTORY


- Traditional owners the Worimi tribe the Burrinbingon People.
- 1860s first mining for coal in Stockton
- 1882 the Stockton Coal Company was formed
- Stockton town established 1889.
- 'Garden Suburb' movement 1910-1930




SITE EXTENT

1.TRAFFIC ROAD HIERARCHY

- Fullerton Street is the only access route
- Mitchell Street main street
- Secondary streets include: King Street, Clyde Street and Monmouth Street
- 40km/hr approved between King and Crown Street




CROWN AND MITCHELL STREET INTERSECTION.

2. PARKING

- 178 on-street parking spaces
- School pick-up and dropoff during peak times.
- Limited opportunity for additional parking
- Opportunity for relocating pedestrian crossing would improve access and increase parking

High turnover on-street parking Mitchell Street



3. ACCESS AND USE SHOP TYPES

- Core retail activity between King and Queen Street
- Intermittent retail down to the Hunter Street
- Food outlets are located near grocery store and around the Crown and Queen Street intersection.
- Increased activity in holiday periods.





SHOP TYPES









NIGHT TIME USE

- Lighting levels are considered low
- Street lighting is yellow/orange colour
- Needs improvement







PEDESTRIAN MOVEMENT

- Mitchell Street crossing, poorly located
- Primary route on western side
- High activity around the school
- Lack of east-west kerb ramps make crossing Mitchell Street hard






PAVEMENT CONDITION

PUBLIC TRANSPORT

- Good access to Newcastle CBD via Ferry
- Bus routes link to regional areas.
- Frequent staggered bus-stops
- No bus shelters




3. ACCESS AND USE CYCLE ROUTES

- Limited on road bike infrastructure










- Low lying areas are prone to flooding
- Limited stormwater inlets
- Large catchment areas
- Significant chambers on road.
- Heritage Sandstone kerbs




