City of Newcastle (CN) acknowledge the Traditional Custodians of this land, a people who belong to the oldest continuing culture in the world.




With works of art curated in consultation with Newcastle Art Gallery, the project allows visitors to continue to engage with the Gallery's significant collection and local artists while preparing for their major expansion project.

This is only the beginning of the ways in which you can interact with the space.

Our Night Galleries illuminate the space - they bring works of art to life with Augmented Reality (AR) and they create a new soundscape for the city.

### They also sleep.

When no one is nearby or the batteries are low, the Night Galleries will sleep, demonstrating the finite resource of power and the importance of conserving supply.





City of Newcastle is pleased to feature LGBTIQ+ artists in the Night Galleries at Kuwumi Place to celebrate Sydney WorldPride, a global festival that has been staged since 2000.

Newcastle Art Gallery has partnered with curator Jasmine Fletcher (founder of local community organisation Queer and Now) to develop *Inside/Out*, an exhibition that brings together works by local artists with those from the Gallery's collection.

Inside/Out speaks to the dichotomy of invisible and visible queer experience. The exhibition celebrates the central role of art in rendering visible the full spectrum of queer experience.

Dani Marti's soft sculpture Orifices is part of a body of work aimed at reducing social exclusion, homophobia and HIV-related stigma. The red dishwashing scourers that make up the installation recall bodily openings and blood cells, organic forms associated with the anxiety around HIV and sexuality.

Marti lives and works between the Hunter Valley, Barcelona and Glasgow. His minimalist sculptures, weavings and videos explore ideas around identity, sexuality and portraiture.

Rock music was deeply formative to Nell's early years growing up in Maitland in New South Wales and continues to be a major influence in her life and work from her home base in Sydney.

Nell's practice is a balance of opposites – black vs white, life vs death, joy vs despair. The ghost on the road will never die 2019 is from a series exploring the similarities and contrasts between rock music and spirituality, both of which have 'gods' that inspire devotion in their followers.

Troy Emery creates an evolving series of mythical sculpted creatures using materials usually associated with craft – lush fabrics, fringing, drapery, pompoms, and tassels.

Layered with hand-cut synthetic black leather, The furthest point from now 2021 depicts a shrouded figure, reflecting personal anxieties and our fears about the state of the natural world.

Tony Albert, a descendant of the Girramay, Yidinji and Kuku-Yalanji peoples, is a contemporary artist whose multi-faceted practice critically explores the culture and politics of Aboriginal and Australian history.

Albert's You Wreck Me series depicts the artist destroying various icons and monuments associated with colonisation, such as a statue of Captain James Cook, by swinging in on a wrecking ball in the manner of pop singer Miley Cyrus's infamous music video. Playful and cathartic, the work uses humour to remind us of the loss of land, culture and identity experienced by First Nations peoples.



Sydney-based artist Owen Leong explores the physical, cultural and political forces that shape our bodies and experiences of the world.

In Aura 2014, the artist's mouth is held open by a stainless steel surgical device and his body is covered in a web of black leather inspired by an eighteenth century engraving of the circulatory system. The work reflects on the way that medical science classifies and sometimes fails to account for the complexity and uniqueness of our bodies.



# The Story of the Night Galleries

The Night Galleries have been built using sustainable products, utilising local suppliers wherever possible, are solar powered and use a green concrete product. They may look simple but they are very smart in terms of design.

This project has been joint funded by City of Newcastle and NSW Justice and Communities, as part of the NSW Community Safety Fund. The intention is that, in known spots where safety is a concern, we can deploy the Night Galleries to light the space and create activity.

The Night Galleries were built using interdisciplinary collaboration, user co-design and test-bed access in real-life environments.

Newcastle has a long history of innovation and resilience, and have emerged as a leading post-industrial smart city with a culture of makers, creatives and problem solvers.

Newcastle is the perfect environment to test which applications will be the most successful in solving urban challenges. The Night Galleries are an outcome of this process concerned with understanding and solving problems that matter.







The building of the Night Galleries has been a collaborative and local endeavour. Working with our partners Design Anthology, a local industrial design business, an idea has been turned into a physical and technological reality.

Newcastle Art Gallery has curated dedicated exhibitions for each location. The Night Galleries have allowed audiences the invaluable opportunity to continue to engage with the nationally significant collection throughout the Gallery's major expansion project.

FastLAB, at the University of Newcastle, applied creativity with technology and interaction, working with local businesses Design+ Industry and Saphi to create the bespoke Night Galleries.
